As we continue through our examination of Paul's letter to the church at Ephesus with our reflection on what it means for us to be the people of God here at Third Church, I would like us to spend some time looking at the final verses of chapter three of that letter – two verses that serve as a closing doxology to Paul's "doctrinal" half of this letter – a letter that flows with praise to God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

After speaking to the unity of the church, which moved Paul into his second prayer in this short letter for the church, Paul's words rose up into a majestic doxology through which God called the people to praise God, and in so doing he reminded them of the "ability" of this God who is worthy to be praised.

Paul wrote:

Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. (Eph 3:20-21)

I want to begin our reflections with a question: Have you ever had the feeling that something promised to you was too good to be true, and still you held on to a thread of hope?

I remember when I was little, whenever my dad would go out and we would ask him where he was going it seems he always answered the same, "I'm going to see a man about a horse." I don't know where that expression originated, but being a gullible child I actually thought that we might get a horse. Now, we lived in Chicago on a small rectangular lot with our neighbor's houses about ten feet to each side of us so I don't know where we would've kept a horse, but I hoped.

That was a childish dream. I had no logical reason to believe that we would get a horse, and, perhaps if I would've known more about clichés, I would've known the difference between a promise grounded in truth and a phrase used to silence an inquisitive child.

Paul has made some grand promises in this letter to the Ephesians. Paul has written about believers being chosen by God the Father before the foundation of the world. Paul has stated how we've been redeemed by the blood of Jesus -- through His sacrificial death upon the cross and His resurrection from the dead. Paul has identified the Church as co-heirs with Christ in the abundant blessings of God, and that our status as children of God has been sealed -- set in stone through the empowering and indwelling Holy Spirit.

We who were once dead in our sins have been made alive through faith in Jesus Christ by the grace that God the Father has extended to us. And by His grace we have purpose -- we have a part to play in God's divine plan. (Eph 2:1-10)

What's more, we're now one with all believers in Christ, whether Jew or Gentile; male or female; black or white or red or yellow or brown; European, or African, or Asian or American. The Church of Jesus is a family which cuts across all barriers -- a family commanded to love and serve one another as brothers and sisters in Christ – a command that will bring us peace and joy when we come to embrace it and live it!

These are wonderful promises and weighty demands. Yet they seem like pie in the sky dreams as we acknowledge our own sinfulness, and, as we observe in our world and in our churches, the racism, the sexism, the economic disparity, the envy, the jealousy and the bitterness that divides, wounds, and even kills.

Yet God promises to unite us as one, and He promises to do so for His own glory and on account of His own holiness.

And so, after three chapters of promises and prayers, the first half of Paul's letter comes to a climax expressed in this call to praise God who has promised to pour out His power upon us in order to work in us His good and perfect will! And along with the call to praise God is the affirmation that God is able to make good on His word!

Paul's words are not pie in the sky promises used to silence a gullible Church. Paul says God can do all that we ask! Even more, God can do exceedingly immeasurably above all that we can imagine.

In other words, God is able! God is able to bring us from death to life through the sacrifice of Christ. God is able to give us meaning, purpose and hope in a world that often seems out of control and filled with despair. God is able to claim us as His children and unite us as one in Christ Jesus despite all the barriers of our world that seek to divide. God is able to heal our hurt, our grief, our sorrow, our physical pain and emotional bruises, and so transform us that we can be His instruments to bring healing to others.

In fact, the reason Paul can speak the magnificent truths he shared in these first three chapters of Ephesians is that God is able to do not only what we can ask or imagine, but immeasurably, abundantly more!

Now as we reflect upon God's ability I would like us to consider that one word, "**ABLE**", and, using it as an acronym, I would like us to investigate four ways suggested from our passage in which God reveals Himself as the One who is "able".

First, God is able because God is **Almighty!**

God alone has the power and the authority to do all that God wills.

As the Almighty God, God has the power to create, for the Scriptures say, "**In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth.**" (Gen 1:1)

As the Almighty God, God has the power to bless and to curse. Even His righteous servant Job in the midst of his despair confessed, "**the Lord gave and the Lord has taken away; may the name of the Lord be praised.**" (Job 1:21)

As the Almighty God, God has the power to judge, for the Scriptures say, "**It is mine to avenge; I will repay,' says the Lord.**" (Rom 12:19)

And, as the Almighty God, God has the power to forgive, for again the Scriptures read, "**I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion.**" (Rom 9:15)

God is holy and just, One who is to be honored and feared because of His great power, but also One who is to be loved because He has chosen to use that power to make us His own special people.

Therefore when we respond to God's love we know that we're sustained by the greatest power in all the world, and that the One who promises is not only willing, but also able to keep His promise.

And so, our God is mighty to sustain us when the temptations of this world – the physical or material or emotional enticements -- seek to drive us from Him. Our God is mighty to comfort us when we feel lonely or depressed or abandoned by those in whom we trusted. Our God is mighty to rekindle the flame in a smoldering marriage, to renew the ministry of a struggling church, to comfort the aches of a weakening body; and, to keep us, our children and our loved ones in His perfect peace despite the terrors of a sin corrupted world.

Our God is able to do all this, and to do it for our ultimate good and His eternal glory because we worship the only Almighty God!

God is able because God is **Almighty.**

Second, God is able because God is **Boundless**.

No time span can limit the working of God. God works within real time but is not bound by time, for Peter writes **“with the Lord: a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day.”** (2 Pt 3:8)

And God’s timing is always right – He will never have to apologize for being “late”, rather, one day we shall find it is we who will need to confess for being impatient!

No space can contain the glory of God, for the Lord declares, **“Heaven is my throne, and the earth is my footstool.”** (Isa 66:1-2)

And David cries out in the 139th Psalm, **“Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.”** (Ps 139:7-8)

We are never beyond God’s reach, and we need never ask of God, “Can you hear me now?”

No need can drain the resources of God. God has not been given a budget within which He must work. There is nothing that we need which shall over extend God’s ability to provide, for God declares, **“the world is mine, and all that is in it.”** (Ps 50:12)

And, no sinful heart is beyond the grace of God, for Paul wrote earlier in this letter, **“It is by grace you have been saved, through faith -- and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God.”** (Eph 2:8)

Moreover, the very purpose of our Lord’s coming was to seek and to save what was lost (Lk 19:10), as Jesus confirmed with those wonderful words: **“For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.”** (Jn 3:16)

God is not bound or limited by our abilities, our desires, or even our sinfulness. What God chooses to do shall be done.

Yet, we often put limits on what we think God can do or should do – for us and for others. We put God in a box. We compose our picture of God and then we expect God to work within those parameters. And we worship this god who is bound and limited by our perceptions and misconceptions, with the inevitable outcome that we’re not worshipping God, but only our corrupted idea of God.

As J. B. Phillips admonishes, our tendency is to create a god who is too small.

And so we create a “magic genie god” whom we expect to appear on command and grant all our wishes -- not realizing that many of our wishes will do more harm than good. Or we create a “policeman god” whom we expect to protect all the good people, like us, and punish the bad people – and we want a say in who is who. Or we create a “blind, deaf and dumb god” who accepts all as they are and demands nothing in return: a god who is strong on self-expression and weak on sin; a god of “love without truth” which is not love at all but merely self-indulgence! Or we create a “dispassionate god” whom we feel could never know us, never accept us, never truly care about us!

Left to ourselves we will always create a god who is no god at all – an idol whom we will eventually tire of worshipping. Which is one reason why I believe so many young adults drift from the church. All too often the God they’re called to worship really isn’t worthy of worship. All too often there’s little sense of awe when the church gathers to worship -- no genuine, healthy, humbling fear of the Lord. And, because the church has failed to present God in all His holiness and glory, His power and majesty and awesomeness, the god of many churches eventually becomes irrelevant, worldly, and not worth our time or energy, or worship!

Ironically, in our modern day attempt to make God more accessible and more palatable we have made Him to seem insignificant. And, if God is truly insignificant, then the relativism, the nihilism, and the fatalism that infects much of our youth culture should not only to be accepted but it is to be expected!

But God is the **Almighty, Boundless** God who will not fit into our molds, and who is supremely relevant, for He alone is the Author and Sustainer of all of life!

Yet, until we recapture an understanding of the boundless majesty of our God -- until we renew in the lives of believers a right understanding of the fear of the Lord -- God will always be overshadowed by the affairs of our busy schedules.

Paul directs us to praise the one true God.

And the God he calls us to worship is worthy of our praise because God is able to do more than we ask or imagine.

And God is able because God is **Almighty** and God is **Boundless**.

Third, God is able because God is **Loving**.

All that God does is done in love, including His creation of male and female in His image.

We were created to live in a love-relationship with God, and from the first sin of mankind up to the present God has been working in love to reunite us with Himself. And so Paul writes in chapter 2 of this letter, "**because of His great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions.**" (Eph 2:4-5)

Now the love that God extends to His children is different than the kind of love often offered in the world. And the difference between God's love and the love the world has to offer can be compared to the difference between a covenant and a contract.

The love offered by the world is more like a contract. And a contract is meant to protect one party from another if failure in the relationship occurs. Sadly, many people enter marriage today having planned, at least in their minds, how to get out of the marriage before it even begins, and, what the "cost" might be just in case it doesn't work!

In such "contractual" relationships there's little understanding of commitment and even less of self-sacrifice. Instead what is entered into is a self-serving agreement. And one way this is evidenced in our society is in the growing acceptance of couples living together before, or even instead of, entering a marriage covenant.

But, the love extended to the church by God is covenant-love – even a marriage sealed in heaven!

God is the Groom and we are the Bride, and He will be true to His union with us! Moreover, God has placed His integrity on the line as His pledge to fulfill His covenant. We may anger God. We may doubt God. We may even turn away from God. But God will never turn away from His Bride. For, God's love for us is based upon God's decision to make us His, independent of our goodness and worthiness.

Now, our relationship with God may lack the joy and fulfillment that God meant it to have, but, that's only because of our disobedience.

And God may discipline us, but God only disciplines us for our good, that we may share in His holiness. (Heb 12:10-11)

Therefore, Paul could write with confidence that nothing in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord -- not even our own infidelity to God. (Rom 8:38-39)

God's love for us is unconditional! In truth, even as the rebellious heart of sinful mankind was causing nails to be driven through the hands of Jesus, Jesus was crying out to the Father for our forgiveness, since, "**While we were yet sinners Christ died for us.**" (Rom 5:8)

God is able to love us, and does love us, even when we're not pleasant to be around!

For God is able to do abundantly more than all we ask or imagine according to the working of His Spirit within us, His Church, because God is **Almighty**, God is **Boundless**, and God is **Loving**.

Fourth, God is **Eternal**. And being eternal means that God always has been and always will be God, the one and only God worthy of our praise, for God is "**the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End**" (Rev 22:13). And being eternal means that God's love, justice and mercy shall never end for they flow from the nature and essence of an ever-faithful God – who existed long before there ever were faithless human beings (2 Tim 2:13). And being eternal means that God will be with us whenever we need Him, and even when we think we don't.

And so, God's eternality means that we have an "Ever-present Helper" who offers everlasting hope, a hope that will not be disappointed, a hope that one day will be fully satisfied when we meet God face to face.

For the God we worship is **ABLE** to do immeasurably more than all we can ask or imagine – indeed, He is the one and only one who is able for He is the only **Almighty, Boundless, Loving, and Eternal** God!

Now does God's ability mean that we will never experience pain, or loneliness, or suffering, or disappointment -- in our own lives or within the Church?

Are these promises of Paul merely a cliché to silence a naive people -- an opiate for the masses as Karl Marx claimed?

There was young boy who at one time in his confusion and heartache might have agreed with Karl Marx, for he grew up believing in God's love and grace, believing that God was able, but then, when he was ten years old, his mother became ill and he prayed fervently for her. He called upon this God whom he trusted but her condition only worsened. Day after day she languished in pain and it seemed as if God was deaf. Finally, one night, his father walked into the boy's room with tears in his eyes, carrying the message that his mother was dead.

Over the years that young boy grew and developed into a brilliant scholar. But as he did he left his faith behind. And this young man seemed to be doing fine without God. He believed he had no need for prayer or worship anymore. Christianity became a mere legend for him -- at first to study and then to refute. Yet, his fascination with many Christian writers and poets kept drawing him back to that faith he had long before rejected. He wanted to believe something but the wound caused by his mother's death, and even more, by God's apparent silence in her pain, seemed too deep to overcome. God's promises rang hollow so Clive fled God, but he always had a nagging sense that God was haunting him, stalking him -- as if God was the hunter and Clive was the prey.

Unable to flee from God any more, one evening in 1929, Clive reluctantly admitted that God was God. He knelt down to pray wondering if the God whom he had abandoned so long ago would actually listen to his voice. And so, in prayer, that young man called out to God for help and realized that night that God had never left his side. In that moment Clive knew that God was no legend. The one who seemed powerless, proved Himself able, and C. S. Lewis, the author of "The Chronicles of Narnia", "Mere Christianity", and many other Christian books, and one who is considered to be one of the greatest Christian apologist of the 20th century, was born anew by the grace of God.

God's promises are no pie in the sky clichés. They're not too good to be true, rather, they're good because they are true.

And they are true because God is able to do all that He promises.

And God is **ABLE** because God is **Almighty, Boundless, Loving** and **Eternal**.

The first half of "Ephesians" ends with this great doxology in verses 20 and 21 in which the Church is put side by side with the risen Lord in the call to glorify God, to bring honor to God through our love and obedience.

But with the call to glorify God comes the promise that we're not alone. We are God's children, and our God has the power to do in and through us immeasurably more than we can ask or imagine.

And so as Paul moves to the second half of this letter he delivers a word of praise to God and a word of encouragement to us, reminding us that God is **ABLE** to work His good and perfect will in us to accomplish all that God commands of us.

Being reminded of God's ability, may we have the strength and courage: to trust in Him; to open our hearts ever wider to receive His love; and, to serve Him with joy, that our service might ascend into God's presence as a never-ending-doxology to the glory of His Name!

A "MADE TO WORSHIP" NIGHT IN AMERICA...

Every year from late August through early February, football fans across the nation spend a few hours on Sunday evenings "glued to the tube" enjoying their favorite sport on NBC's "Football Night in America." The well-known contemporary Christian songwriter and singer, Chris Tomlin was wise to tap into this fervor when he began to plan his recent road tour, calling it "Worship Night in America." Chris's ministry has been a great blessing to the Church as evidenced in the popularity of such songs as, "How Great Is Our God", "Jesus Messiah" and "I Will Rise" to name just a few. Last fall when I bought tickets for his tour stop at the Albany Times Union Center in mid-April, I was excited and filled with anticipation, as I knew this wouldn't just be a run-of-the-mill concert but truly an evening of inspiring, grace-filled worship. I and the thousands of other Christians who packed the TU Center weren't disappointed! Our own Dee Dominy was there, too (loved it!), and I ran into many friends with whom I've led and participated in worship with over the years. It was a glorious evening!

Many times, concerts such as these have lesser-known artists who "open" for the headlining performer. Indeed five different names were listed in the promotion of this event so I was expecting a "full" evening. Much to my surprise, Chris and all five of his guests took the stage at the start and pretty much held it for all two hours and 45 minutes of worship! At times the other artists might be featured on songs they wrote but the whole team was involved in a supporting role. One female artist sang several songs in Spanish to the delight of the diverse crowd. Chris and his friends all agreed that it was the most "amped-up" crowd they'd seen yet on the tour. And while seasoned performers like Tomlin have no problem interspersing personal testimonies and biblical insights, Chris aimed to ensure we were given a healthy dose of preaching and teaching! He invited his home pastor to join him on the tour, Australian-born Darren Whitehead, who shared an enthusiastic message about the "Seven Hebrew Words for 'Praise'" that are sprinkled about the Old Testament.

It's amazing how smartphones have become such a part of large-crowd experiences as this. Very nearly everyone is taking pictures, recording video, texting/snapchatting/facebooking friends or waving them around like candles with their flashlights on. Not to be left behind, I kept in touch with my two daughters throughout the concert, though for two very different reasons--Alida was at Fenway Park in Boston at a Yankees Red Sox game (so I was keeping tabs on that) and I shared some video of Matt Maher singing Natalie's favorite worship song, "Lord I Need You." Hey, when in Rome...! I do think my favorite fun moment of the night, though, came when I looked several yards over to my right and saw two nuns, in full habits, singing, clapping, and going to town on their cellphones right along with everyone else!

After nearly three hours, no one really wanted to go home. The crowd egged the band on for several encores, which they were more than happy to oblige. This was a spiritually refreshing, mountaintop

experience. Keep an eye out for similar such events and go--you'll be blessed! Another song Tomlin is well known for is "Made to Worship"--

*Before the day, before the light

It’s been a truly amazing experience so please continue to pray and thank God for the chance to share with him. It is also incredibly exciting that this past month we got to baptize him as well!”

From Joshua Multunas (at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary) – “The biggest update is that this Summer I have decided to do a five week mission trip to Dubai! This is a really unique opportunity to work with a local church and minister to people from all over the Middle East, Africa and Asia who are employed in Dubai on short-term work visas. We will be teaching church members how to both study the Bible for themselves, and how to teach other to study the Bible. This is really exciting because they will be able to take this knowledge with them back to their home countries once their work visa finish. This is one of the most effective ways I can pay forward the education that I’m receiving.”

From Andy Lightcap (Capital District Youth For Christ) – “Alex had been coming to Campus Life for a while and he has been growing in his walk with Jesus. However, when he walked in the door he declared to me that he no longer wanted to trust God because he wasn’t sure prayer worked. Alex told me about the pain he experiences every day that he is bullied at school. Alex and all of his hurt and all of his pain is why Jesus came.

James is a young man who has been attending Cambridge Campus Life. James’ father and grandfather recently died a few weeks apart. Right now James is so grief stricken and feels as though he has been dealt more than he can handle. As I think of this boy and the absolute sorrow that he is dealing with, I am reminded that kids like James are why Jesus came.

Sometimes our ministry sites can be described as spiritual triage units, full of kids who are spiritually sick. These kids are broken and wounded. They’re lost and hopeless. Our job is to bring them healing, direction and hope; to bring them to Jesus.

We are so thankful for your partnership in this ministry.”

Being Fed by Others – *“Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation.” – 1 Peter 2:2*

Each one of us began our walk with the Lord because someone told us about Jesus and took the time to teach us about Him and what it means to follow Him. Think about who has “fed” your faith and give thanks for them.

Feeding Ourselves – *“I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you.” - Psalm 119:11*
